cameras on the back of fences??!!

Parents are going to use their cameras and they will are going to object to any type of censorship - they will continue to post umpire "goofs" on YouTube, etc. We have to understand that this is not going to change.

Umpires must understand they are being watched every time they step on the field. They need good training on the topic of "Game Management".







("The First Amendment protects the right to gather information about what public officials do on public property, and specifically, a right to record matters of public interest.")

Members of the public and the media do not need a permit to film or photograph in public places and police have no power to stop them filming or photographing incidents or police personnel.

Several Supreme Court cases recognize that the First Amendment protects film as a form of expression.

It's illegal for someone to film what you say or do when you have a reasonable expectation of privacy, whether in a public space or at home. Placing hidden cameras in public places where people expect privacy also breaks video recording laws.



How can we use spectator's videos to our advantage?

Do you ignore the video? How do you handle it?

Be PREPARED to have conversations with spectators!

Show spectators you have an interest in helping your umpires get better.

Use it as a learning tool!



Use Technology To Teach!



Softball Fields Are <u>Our</u> Environment:

- Are you able to playfully turn it around on the fans and spark softball conversation? (Solicit them becoming an umpire)
- Let spectators know when they are wrong (hand out books to fans, get them interested in wanting to know the rules)

Technology Can Help Your Umpires!

Worst thing to do is "I don't want to see it" or ignore the customer. Could have a potential umpire watching your reactions.

Be sure to use appropriate language while on the field and standing near the fence.

Try to <u>NOT</u> be the umpire that ends up on YouTube.

We have rules for that!!





Purpose of *Social Media Guidelines* for USA Softball Umpires.

To give <u>helpful</u>, <u>practical advice</u> when operating on the internet as a representative of USA Softball.

The *Guidelines* apply to all USA Softball members who create or contribute to: blogs, forums, social networks, or any other form of Social Media.

Things to Remember When You're On Social Media



• Consider Social Media communications as public at all times.

 On Social Media you may be publicly associated with USA Softball and your umpiring partners, so act/share accordingly.

• Communication among umpires for learning purposes should be done <u>PRIVATELY</u>, not through Social Media.

Some "DONT's" of Social Media



- Avoid posting specifics about your schedule.
- Refrain from posting disparaging remarks (criticism) about others.
- Don't show favoritism for teams, players, etc.
- Refrain from posting specifics about games, whether good or bad.



Some "DONT's" of Social Media (Cont.)



- Don't post detail about other umpire assignments until that information has been released.
- Don't use Social Media to criticize state/local association policies and practices.
- Do NOT post pictures of yourself while at a Championship, either during or between games.



Some "DO's" of Social Media



- Be <u>VERY CAREFUL</u> in the sharing of your personal information, including photos.
- Use Social Media to <u>share information</u> with members of your association.
- Use Social Media as a <u>recruitment tool</u>!
- Keep things <u>positive when posting</u> on Social Media.
- Remember, post on Social Media are <u>VISIBLE TO THE PUBLIC</u>!



Joe is umpiring in a USA Softball Championship and he finds out Saturday night which umpires in the crew will be umpiring on the final four games on Sunday.

Joe decides to post the schedule of the selected umpires and their assignments for "Championship Sunday" on his local association's *FACEBOOK* page.

Is Daryl following the USA Softball Umpire Social Media Guidelines? Why or Why Not?



Matt is umpiring in a USA Softball Championship. During a game, John (PU on his crew) makes an obstruction call on F2 with R1 attempting to score. Although the defensive coach does not question the call, Matt feels John might be wrong on his call but since he isn't sure, play continues with out incident.

After the game, Matt sends a description of the play to his local association's FACEBOOK page back home and asks for other umpire's opinions – was John right or wrong on the call?

Social Media – Wrap Up



- <u>USA Softball Umpires</u> should set appropriate boundaries between their <u>personal</u> and <u>public</u> online behavior.
- What an umpire feels is "<u>personal</u>" on Social Media often becomes "<u>public</u>" without their consent.
- Review the <u>private settings</u> on any Social Media site and use good judgement when posting comments and information.






What is the role of the umpire(s)?



- In the eyes of fans and players alike, many believe the Softball Umpire is there to call balls and strikes or rule a baserunner safe or out.
- Although those may be duties of umpires, there are three elements of umpiring:
 - **1. Managing the game**
 - 2. Controlling the game
 - **3. Keeping the integrity of the game.**

Keeping the integrity of the game



- Where do we start?
- Integrity is our *most important* commodity!

 Avoid writing, posting, or acting in a way that would embarrass The Times or compromise your ability to do your job



Assume that your professional life and your personal life will merge <u>online or in-person</u> regardless of your care to separate them.

UMPIRE MANUAL CODE OF ETHICS FOR UMPIRES

- 1. Honor all contracts regardless of possible inconvenience or financial basis in a punctual and professional manner.
- 2. Study the rules and mechanics of the game diligently, observe the work of other good umpires, and attempt to improve at all times.
- 3. Remember that while your work as an umpire is important, you must conduct yourself in such a way that spectator attention is directed to the players during the game and not at you.
- 4. Dress and maintain your appearance in a manner befitting the dignity and importance of the umpire.
- 5. Be fair and unbiased in your decisions, rendering them without regard to the score or the quality of the play on the field.
- 6. Cooperate and be professional in your associations with your fellow umpires and do nothing to cause them public embarrassment.
- 7. Be firm but not overbearing; positive but never rude; dignified but never 'cocky.' Remember the good umpire doesn't have to have the last word.






UMPIRE MANUAL CODE OF ETHICS FOR UMPIRES

- 8. Be prepared both physically and mentally to administer the game.
- 9. Do not smoke on or in the vicinity of the playing field, nor drink any alcoholic beverages before the game you are to work.
- 10. Do not give information which might be used by a team's future opponent.
- 11. Keep in mind that the game is more important than the wishes of any individual player or coach or the ambitions of any individual umpire.

12. You represent USA Softball at all times.

- 13. Administer the game with clear, concise, and proper communication skills both verbal and nonverbal.
- 14. Accept responsibility for all your actions.



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


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
